HAPPENINGS AROUND THE CHURCH

WE ARE STILL WORKING!

Yes, the Sew, Tie and Roll group is still hard at work. We have been meeting every other month and have sewn and then knotted 35 mission quilts, 23 fleece quilts and rolled 603 bandages. You can join us at any time – our next Sew day is on November 12th at 9:00 am – till noon. It is not difficult and a lot of fun!

All the Mission quilts, fleece quilts and rolled bandages are taken to Lutheran World Relief in New Windsor. From there, they are sent to developing countries and the United States to be used by families and individuals in need. The bandages are used in mission clinics and hospitals in foreign countries as protection over injuries, bites and surgeries, etc.

If you can't come on a sew day to help, there are <u>other ways</u> to help our cause.

- Donation of money the money is used to buy materials that we need and we also send \$2.25 per quilt along to New Windsor to help with shipping costs.
- Donations of material any material that you are not in need of can be made into quilts. We cut squares and we use it for backing material etc.

Donations of sheets – sheets of any size, color, print or plain. These are used for squares for Mission quilts, backing for Mission quilts and white sheets are used for bandages. If you know someone that works in a hotel/motel, you could contact them and ask for their

old sheets as they are replaced at the hotel/motel. Even if a sheet is torn, we can use parts of it.

Donation of thread – we use many colors for sewing the Mission quilts.

Mattress covers – we use these as batting in the center of the Mission quilts. Normally we have to buy batting but if we have mattress covers, this can save us money. Any size is fine.

Slow Cooker Buffalo Chicken Chili

Buffalo Chicken Chili is delicious, simple and award winning! This is the go-to when you are tired of boring chili recipes!

Prep Time 20 minutes Cook Time 4 hours Total Time 4 hours 20 minutes Servings 8 Calories 277 kcal Author Slow Cooker Gourmet

Ingredients

1 pound ground chicken 15 oz canned white navy beans drained and rinsed 14.5 oz can fire roasted tomatoes drained 2 cups chicken broth 1/4 - 1/2 cup <u>buffalo wing sauce</u> start with 1/4 cup and add more at end if needed 1 package ranch dressing mix 1 cup frozen corn kernels 1/2 teaspoon onion powder 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder 1/2 teaspoon celery salt 1/2 teaspoon dried cilantro 1/4 teaspoon salt 8 oz cream cheese Blue cheese crumbles optional

Instructions

Brown ground chicken until fully cooked, place in crock (or brown ahead of time and store in fridge until ready to assemble)
Add remaining ingredients except for cream cheese and blue cheese and give it all a stir to combine
Add block of cream cheese on the top and cover
Cook on high for 4 hours or low for 8
Stir to incorporate cream cheese and add additional wing sauce as desired
Top individual bowls with blue cheese crumbles if desired

St. John's Chili & Bakery Cook-Off The Winning Bakery Recipe By Maggie Langdon

RUMMY TUM TUM CAKE

Heat oven to 350 degrees

box chocolate cake mix
 box chocolate instant pudding (not sugar free) 4-1/2 cup serving size
 cup oil
 cup sour cream
 cup rum (or 1/3 cup light cream)
 tsps rum or vanilla extract
 large eggs
 oz package semi-sweet chocolate chips

Spray bundt pan with non-stick spray.

Place dry cake mix and dry pudding in bowl of electric mixer and bet on low until combined.

Add oil, sour cream, rum and extract – beat on low until mixed.

Mix in eggs, one at a time, beat after each one. Batter should be fluffy – if not beat on high for 2 more minutes.

Add chocolate chips by hand – do not over stir to retain air.

Spoon batter into bundt pan and smooth top.

Bake for 50 minutes until cake tester comes out clean.

Cool for 20 minutes. Loosen cake and unmold onto plate and cool completely before frosting.

FROSTING

1/2 cup butter
1 cup granulated sugar
1/3 cup rum (or light cream)
1/2 cup chocolate chips
1 tsp rum or vanilla extract
1/2 to 1 cup confectioners (powdered) sugar

Place butter, sugar and rum in medium sauce pan. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Reduce heat to medium and cook for 2 minutes. Add 1/2 cup chocolate chips, stir them in and remove from heat.

Stir in extract.

Let cool to room temperature. If not thick enough, add enough powdered sugar to bring to spreading consistence. Frost cake and refrigerate to harden frosting completely. Cover with foil if refrigerating for more than 2 hours.
